The Five Year Plan and the Annual Plan were on display for public comment with all the supporting documents at the Georgia Department of Community Affairs (DCA) Atlanta Office 60 Executive Park South, NE, Atlanta, GA 30329-2231 and the Five year and Annual Plan were on display at DCA's regional offices. The comment period lasted from February 21, 2003 until April 7, 2003.

A Public Hearing was held at DCA Atlanta Office on Tuesday, April 8, 2003 at 9:00 A. M..

The Resident Advisory Board was mailed a copy of the Five Year and Annual Plan on February 21, 2003. The Resident Advisory Board had an opportunity to Comment on the Five Year and Annual Plan until March 10, 2003.

DCA has started a project-based voucher program in its jurisdiction. DCA is reserving twenty (20) percent of its total allocation of vouchers for project based activities. As part of the Five Year Plan, DCA wants to expand housing opportunities and take affirmative measures to ensure accessible housing is available to persons with disabilities. The goal is to attach subsidy to units specifically for families/individuals with disabilities. A service provider must provide a supportive service component for DCA to approve the project activity. DCA's Board of Commissioners approved the changes to the Administrative Plan that includes provisions for project based assistance. A copy of the request for project-based assistance was sent to HUD's field office under separate cover and has been previously approved. The Millennium Project which was approved by DCA's Board of Commissioners had the Southwest Georgia Housing Development Corporation as the developer and the Permanent Supportive Housing Program as the supportive service provider was put into service this year. The Cuthbert Housing Authority is administering the Millennium Center.

Attachments

A. In order to facilitate mobility and give program participants the maximum flexibility in locating housing, program participants are encouraged to look for housing in any of the one hundred forty nine (149) counties in the Georgia Department of Community Affairs (DCA) jurisdiction. Eligible families are also advised a family may relocate in other housing authorities' jurisdictions through the portability process if suitable housing is not available in the jurisdiction that issued the original subsidy. Families will be given a list of housing authorities within the State of Georgia.

DCA will investigate and analyze when voucher holders are experiencing difficulties locating or obtaining housing units outside areas of concentration.

The assistance provided to families experiencing difficulties locating or obtaining housing units outside areas of concentration includes:

Briefing the family about the benefits of moving outside the areas with a high concentration of poverty;

Formal or informal discussion with landlord groups;

Formal or informal discussion with social service agencies.

DCA's Payment Standard for its entire jurisdiction of one hundred forty nine (149) counties is set at one hundred ten (110) per cent of the HUD established Fair Market Rent for the area. The Payment Standard will change annually, October 1, the same date HUD Fair Market Rents are effective. DCA relies on the HUD Fair Market Rent standard for establishing rents at a level that is high enough to allow families to select units in areas of low density and poverty, but low enough so that a maximum number of families may receive housing assistance.

B. STATEMENT OF PROGRESS IN MEETING THE FIVE YEAR PLAN MISSION AND GOALS

The Georgia Department of Community Affairs (DCA) has one hundred seventeen (117) percent participation in DCA's FSS program. Forty five (45) percent of DCA's FSS participants have escrow balances.

DCA was awarded an additional one hundred fifty one (151) Welfare to Work vouchers increasing the number of Welfare to Work vouchers from two thousand

(2,000) to two thousand one hundred fifty one (2,151). DCA has two thousand six (2006) Welfare to Work vouchers under contract.

DCA was awarded seventy five (75) Mainstream vouchers and is working with service providers in the disability community to provide effective utilization of the Mainstream Vouchers in DCA's current fiscal year.

DCA will be implementing its homeownership program before the end of the current fiscal year.

In conjunction with the Southwest Georgia Housing Development Corporation, DCA developed a project based Voucher Program for the Millennium Center in conjunction with a treatment program to house heads of households who are in danger of losing their children do to substance abuse problems. The first residents were housed during the current fiscal year.

DCA is developing a project based voucher program to be located in Cherokee County, GA that will benefit abused mothers

DCA is committed to providing more housing opportunities for permanent supportive housing projects throughout Georgia by providing project based vouchers.
