Western Piedmont Council of Governments Public Housing Agency administers only the Section 8 Rental Housing Assistance Program. As a Section 8 program "only", the PHA is submitting a Streamlined Plan, in accordance with guidance provided in 24 CFR Part 903 Public Housing Plans; Interim Rule, February 18, 1999. The only significant changes in Program operation from the previous year have been the implementation of a Home Ownership program and the PHA's first project based assistance set-aside.

The PHA continues to operate within the four county area of Alexander, Burke, Caldwell and Catawba Counties of North Carolina, with a unit allocation of 1019 units. Requests for additional funding/units are submitted whenever the opportunity arises. The PHA owns no assisted housing units. Primary housing needs in the PHA service area continue to relate to affordability and availability. The PHA continues to try to address these issues by trying to keep the FMRs as high as deemed possible within the PHA's budget authority, so as to attract more and better quality units into the program. The PHA's efforts in this regard seem to make a difference in the availability of housing units but the resultant increases in the average HAP payments have negatively impacted the PHA's ability to serve all allocated units. The PHA's budget authority is not adequate to sustain the unit allocation at the current average HAP levels.

Consistent with the PHA's 5 Year Plan, this Annual Plan reiterates activities aimed at expanding the level of assistance that can be provided, through attempts to obtain additional unit allocations.

No substantial deviations from the 5 Year Plan are anticipated.

## Family Self Sufficiency Program

Although the PHA is identified with a minimum FSS participant level of 125, the PHA has never successfully implemented the FSS program. Over the years the PHA submitted applications for special DHUD funding to support this program but the PHA's requests for assistance were always denied. As cited by the PHA in prior correspondence to DHUD, the PHA does not have the financial resources to support the additional staff that would be necessary to implement and operate the FSS Program.

## Summary of Progress Toward 5-Year Plan

The PHA's stated mission and goals are basic and fundamental considerations for compliance with the intent and regulations governing the Section 8 Housing assistance program. Funding constraints and the resulting limitations this places on staffing levels, make it impossible for the PHA to do much more than strive for compliance within its basic operation. All of the PHA's efforts are consistent with the mission of promoting adequate and affordable housing, economic opportunity and a suitable, discrimination-free environment.

It is believed that progress has been made toward the stated 5-year Plan mission and goals, but the only concrete means of measuring this success is the fact that 950+ families are being assisted in obtaining and sustaining housing that meets HQS standards. The fact that these efforts continue is evidence to some degree that progress is being made. The PHA's goals are on-going issues that can never be fully achieved. The PHA will always attempt to obtain additional funding/unit allocations, so long as the demand for assistance exceeds the supply. Likewise, the PHA will always strive to manage its programs more efficiently and effectively, while attempting to attract more property owners to participate in the program.

## Resident Member on PHA Governing Board

We do not have a Section 8 resident on our PHA Board. Since we became aware that this had been made a requirement, along with the Resident Advisory Boards, we have made periodic attempts to solicit participants to serve on a Resident Advisory Board, with the thinking and intent that this Board would serve as an appropriate way of identifying someone to serve on the PHA Board.

During the year 2000 we were able to recruit 4 people willing to serve on the Resident Advisory Board and held one meeting. Given that small number of people, we continued to invite others to serve without success. To our dismay, as we tried to recruit additional participants to serve along with the initial four, ALL four of the initial people left the program in 2001, either voluntarily or due to program violations.

Our latest effort has been to try to "hand-pick" possible participants to serve on the Resident Advisory Board, since numerous random invitations have not been successful. The response again has been inadequate but we are committed to continuing the effort. We still feel that a participant member on the PHA Board would be best selected from, or at least by, the Resident Advisory Board, rather than staff making this selection. When / if we successfully organize the Resident Advisory Board, we will move to place a participant on the PHA Board, but it is impossible to realistically predict when that will be.

The PHA believes that it is unrealistic to require Section 8 Only PHAs to have Resident Advisory Boards and participant members of the PHA Board. We have no way to maintain the frequent contact with clients like Public Housing PHAs can and with the frequent turn-over in the Section 8 clients, we do not think that there can be enough continuity for these efforts to be worthwhile.
