Ed Zaidman wanted to know if HUD had any grant program to buy him an apartment/condo so he could own it and not pay rent.

Jess Simmers said his apartment allowed pets, but the problem exists of the pet owners who do not follow the rules set up for pet ownership. Typically, as a good neighbor he didn't want to cause problems, so he didn't tell anyone about the rule or regulation violations.

Gail Steinberg was interested in more affordable apartments in Klamath Falls since it seems our town is growing. The plan shows that KHA is building, doing affordable housing preservation conversions, or partnering with developers to achieve the goal of building new affordable housing... Ms. Steinberg was also interested in the terminally ill Vouchers since she has a friend who has some debilitating diseases and would probably be terminally ill by the KHA definitions.
