

Lanny Gorman, Executive Director of the Hot Springs Housing Authority, welcomed the group and thanked everyone for their attendance. Judith Brown represented Eastwood Gardens Public Housing Site A and Danny Hughes represented Site B. Glenda De Priest and Clara Sue Cockman represented Mountainview Towers. Housing Authority staff attending the meeting included Lanny Gorman, Jane Ury, Ed Mitchell, Dawn Waddle, Joni Heritage, Roberta Firestone, Tracey Mc Elroy and R. F. Otto.

Since the establishment of the 1998 Quality Housing and Work Responsibility Act, Resident Advisory Boards have been required. Their role is to participate in the public housing planning process on an annual basis. Proposed future plans have to be documented in the Annual Plan submitted to HUD. REAC inspections by HUD provide a base for suggested future improvements and the annual meeting serves as a vehicle to receive feedback from the residents.

Mr. Gorman talked about the 2002 and 2003 annual reports which indicated a breakdown of suggested improvements, cost of the project, actual amount spent and if the project was complete. He pointed out some of the completed improvements and the cost such as the boilers, kitchen cabinets, parking lot improvements, and bathroom showers in various locations on the property.

As a result of the Fair Housing Review some physical conditions of the property have to be amended to conform to HUD requirements. The degree of the slant on some sidewalks have to be changed to accommodate wheelchairs. Sidewalks have to be torn out and new ones installed. The cost of changes to fulfill the Fair Housing Review requirements can reduce the number of improvements previously planned. The 2003 and 2004 Capital Funds will be expended to meet the requirements of the 504 Voluntary Compliance Agreement.

Application fee – ex offenders away. They are checked on the computer and by police.

EASTWOOD GARDENS PUBLIC HOUSING

- TOPIC: Black wrought iron railings in front of units would add curb appeal.
- RESPONSE: The PHA agrees that the iron railings would significantly improve the appearance of the apartments, however, this work cannot be done until adequate capital funds are available.
- TOPIC: Concern Draining by bridge on Cypress Street needs attention. the current walkway to the bridge needs to extend the full

distance and be smoothed out.

- RESPONSE: An on-site visit will be required to determine if improvements can be made from the operating fund.
- TOPIC: Sweet gum trees at 1000 Illinois Street create a safety hazard as the sweet gum balls fall on the ground and become a safety hazard.
- RESPONSE: Maintenance staff will continue to try to keep sweet gum balls off the sidewalk and parking area...may cut tree in the fall.
- TOPIC: The unused playground area behind the Community Center on Site B should be cleared of the unused playground equipment. Clear the area for a better walkway to the building.
- RESPONSE: The PHA concurs that the playground equipment should be removed.
- TOPIC: 1000 Illinois sidewalks need attention.
- RESPONSE: Sidewalks needing attention will be addressed in a future Capital Program.
- TOPIC: Fire alarms do not function properly.

RESPONSE:	Fire alarms are tested each time maintenance staff enters and apartment and during annual inspections.
TOPIC:	59 units on Site B have older kitchen cabinets to be replaced.
RESPONSE: Program.	Cabinets will be addressed in a future Capital Fund
TOPIC:	The electrical systems on Site A and Site B are the original, are outdated, and need to be replaced.
RESPONSE:	An engineering evaluation of the electrical distribution is planned for A and B Sites.
TOPIC:	Ants have been a recurring problem.
RESPONSE:	A large scale recurring spraying program appears to be the only way to control fire ants.
TOPIC:	The community Centers floors need to be stripped of old wax and new applied. This is being addressed.
RESPONSE:	This is being addressed.
TOPIC:	There is missing vinyl siding on the Community Center and on some units on sites which need to be replaced. Some fascia boards are missing the metal flashing.
RESPONSE:	Vinyl siding and metal flashing will be addressed with future capital funds.
TOPIC:	Lower limbs on trees need to be removed. Children are climbing, hanging and running on the lower limbs. These are mostly in the 221 Autumn Street area and on Spring Street.
RESPONSE:	Lower limbs will be trimmed.
TOPIC:	Areas outside laundromats and around public telephones need better lighting. Some fixtures may need wiring.
RESPONSE:	Additional lighting will be provided where needed.
TOPIC:	Lighting between buildings is not sufficient. Undesirable activities have been reported in these areas. The police report that the current lighting is not adequate.

RESPONSE: Lighting that is in proper working condition provide sufficient lighting in most areas. TOPIC: It was suggested that existing attic fans be removed and the spaces sealed. The fans which are original to the buildings are very loud and inadequate. Wasps use the open space to enter the buildings. Ceiling fans with lights have been requested. The airflow could be adjusted between seasons for better distribution of air. **RESPONSE:** Capital funds may be used to purchase ceiling fans or provide air conditioners. TOPIC: Residents have requested that children be allowed to play in the playground area not being used behind the Community Center on Site A. **RESPONSE:** There does not seem to be any reason why this area should not be used. The Site Manager and Resident Council will be advised. TOPIC: Basketball courts need new hoops with metal nets. A low one has been installed for younger children. A sign posted with Open and Closed hours could be posted on a locked gate in order to control unwanted late night use of the courts. A resident has offered to lock and unlock the gates on a daily basis. **RESPONSE:** Metal nets can be provided as well as locks. TOPIC: Children have been climbing on fences and onto the roof of the Site A office. Reprimands from the office manager and the police have not discouraged them. PHA staff will attempt to determine what type of physical Response: barrier can be installed to stop access to the roof. TOPIC: The clear story windows at the Site A Community Center need attention. The plexiglass windows in the office have a mold problem. The mold situation will be addressed. One window is not secured. **RESPONSE:** Maintenance will attempt to correct this problem.

MOUNTAINVIEW TOWERS

TOPIC:	Front loading machines have been suggested when replacing laundry equipment. Residents in wheelchairs and short people have trouble reaching top controls. This project has been included in the 2003 CFP.
RESPONSE:	If front loading laundry equipment is purchased the PHA will ensure controls are accessible from the front of the machine before purchasing.
TOPIC:	The aluminum strip on the outside edge of balcony floors makes it difficult to sweep off balconies. A drain located nearby gets stopped up.
RESPONSE:	The aluminum strips are being removed from the building.
TOPIC:	Kickplates on bottom of unit doors would prevent wheelchair marks on doors.
RESPONSE:	Kickplates will be budgeted from future capital funding.
TOPIC:	Craft room needs two more lights installed. Lighting in insufficient for games and crafts.
RESPONSE:	Two additional lights will be installed.
TOPIC:	Put retainer wall around trees in front of building. Fill area with topsoil and plant ground cover. Remove unneeded or dead trees in area and plant smaller ones.
RESPONSE:	Future capital funds will bed expended to meet this need.
TOPIC:	Design and erect a "Hot Springs Housing Authority" sign at the end of the property.
RESPONSE:	Capital funding, as available, will be expended to erect a sign.
TOPIC:	Place a "Don't Block Driveway" or "Loading and Unloading Area Only" sign in front of building to prevent illegal parking by visitors. Perhaps paint diagonal white stripes across driveway.
RESPONSE:	Designation sign / stripping can be installed to help alleviate this problem.

- TOPIC: Replace window screens on units that do not have them.
- RESPONSE: Maintenance staff will replace screens that are missing.
- TOPIC: Kitchen cabinets are original to building and need to be replaced.
- RESPONSE: Future capital funds will be expended to met this need.
- TOPIC: Floors need to be stripped of wax and re-applied at least once a year. Arrangements have been made for a cleaning service to clean the blinds and windows, the bathrooms, etc. on a regular basis.
- RESPONSE: The PHA will obtain information.
- TOPIC: The alarm system controlling unauthorized use of exit doors from stairways is very loud when activated and can be heard in the lobby. It was requested that they be turned on before 10:00 p.m. Mr. Gorman advised that the alarm should be left on all the time.
- RESPONSE: Mr. Gorman advised that the alarm system should be left on at all times.
- TOPIC: Trees with root problems are uprooting the bricks on the back patio. The bricks are uneven which creates a tripping hazard. The sewer system is also affected by the tree roots.
- RESPONSE: The tree root problems on the patio will require capital funding to correct.

Mr. Gorman thanked the group for their input and declared the meeting adjourned.

ar031c01 PUBLIC HEARING FOR HOT SPRINGS HOUSING AUTHORITY 2004 ANNUAL PLAN MARCH 18, 2004

A public hearing was held Thursday, March 18, 2004 at 5:00 p.m. at the Hot Springs Housing Authority Mountainview Towers building, 110 Highrise Circle, Hot Springs, Arkansas.

Housing Authorities are required to hold an annual public hearing to hear improvement suggestions from the public as a result of the Quality Housing Work Responsibility Act of 1998. The March 18 meeting was held for the purpose of discussing the Annual Plan for 2004.

Lanny Gorman, Executive Director of the Housing Authority welcomed the eighteen persons who attended. Jane Ury, Administrative Assistant, also of the Housing Authority attended.

Improvements made at the Mountainview Towers facilities and Eastwood Gardens Apartments for the years 2002 and 2003 were presented. Mr. Gorman explained the costs of improvements. The cost of repair for the concrete reconstructuring at the Mountainview Towers is escalating as repair work continues. This project will have to be financed from capital funds received for the years 2002 and 2003.

As a result of a Fair Housing Review conducted by HUD a major part of the 2003 and 2004 Capital Funds and \$89,894 of the 2003 Bonus Funds will be targeted for 504 Compliance requirements. These include ramps being redesigned with the correct degree of slant to assure easy access for persons in wheelchairs. Sidewalks not conforming to a specific degree of slant will be torn out and rebuilt. Visual / hearing aids in units will be required and also a handicap accessible walkway to the basketball court. New laundry equipment is slated for Mountainview Towers laundromat. The existing clothes folding shelf may be removed to accommodate two new washers and two new dryers.

The 504 Compliance includes new kitchen cabinets at a 34" height in the Stage Room and bathroom light switches being reinstalled at a 48" height for accessibility in the six handicap accessible units. The Housing Authority received \$451,055.00 in 2003 for capital fund improvements.

The Hot Springs Housing Authority was fortunate to receive a bonus fund for 2003. HUD allows housing authorities two years to obligate projected improvements from the time funds are received and an additional two years to expend the funds. Some housing authorities are not successful in achieving this. The unused funds are returned to HUD to be distributed to housing authorities who meet the time requirements. The Hot Springs Housing Authority received a bonus fund of \$89,894.00 for 2003.

The proposed 2004 budget will be submitted to HUD. A major portion of the funds received will be applied to the 504 Compliance requirements. Bathrooms in the Administration building do not meet the handicap accessible requirements. Additional space for management is also needed. The proposed 2004 budget totals \$451,055.00.

The Hot Springs Housing Authority was granted a one-year grant for a Family Self-Sufficiency Program. The program is designed to assist eligible Section 8 tenants attend school, receive aptitude testing, set goals and obtain a job. By meeting the program requirements the Housing Authority can provide savings in an escrow bank account to be presented to the tenant upon completion of their program. It provides incentive for tenants to improve themselves and to become self sufficient.

Mr. Gorman explained that the Hot Springs Housing Authority serves as the HUD Contract Administrator for Park Place Apartments owned by an individual in Jonesboro, Arkansas. By refinancing bonds for Park Place Apartments the Hot Springs Housing Authority was able to accumulate a substantial savings account. HUD stipulates that these monies have to be used for new housing. To date a duplex and a triplex have been built. Rent collected from these units is set aside for additional housing. In the near future new construction will begin at another site.

The Mountainview Towers residents presented the following problems.

- Hot water needs to be evenly distributed through Mountainview Towers .
- Broken floors on patios create walking hazard Mr. Gorman explained that concrete situation on the exterior will be repaired first as planned. Then patio floors could be addressed.
- Brick floor in MVT lobby is not feasible for senior and disabled tenants.
- Could designated parking spaces for handicapped be placed closer to front of the building?
- Newspapers are being left in building lobby because papers are stolen when left in front of tenants' doors. Some tenants report not having any papers left. Could the unit front door have slot for paper?

Mr. Gorman thanked everyone for their input and adjourned the meeting.



EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

THE 2003 PHA'S SCORE FOR THE HOT SPRINGS HOUSING AUTHORITY WAS 93 RESULTING IN A HIGH PERFORMANCE DESIGNATION.

THE REAC PHYSICAL INSPECTION SCORE OF 97 IS THE RESULT OF THE EMPHASIS PLACED ON IMPROVING THE PROPERTY THROUGH PRUDENT MANAGEMENT OF CAPITOL FUNDS. CONTINUED CAPITAL FUNDING WILL BE REQUIRED TO MAINTAIN THE PROPERTY AT THIS LEVEL OF PERFORMANCE.

IN MAY/JUNE 2004 FAIR HOUSING CONDUCTED A CIVIL RIGHTS / 504 COMPLIANCE REVIEW. THE PHA WAS REQUIRED TO ENTER INTO A VOLUNTARY COMPLIANCE AGREEMENT TO CORRECT 504 DEFICIENCIES. IT IS ESTIMATED THAT THE COST FOR THIS WORK COULD REQUIRE CAPITAL FUNDS EXCEEDING \$500,000 OVER A THREE YEAR PERIOD.

THE PHA CONTINUES TO HAVE HIGH VACANCIES EVEN THOUGH SECURITY AND THE PHYSICAL CONDITION OF THE PROPERTY IS GOOD. VACANCY RATES ARE LOW IN THE ELDERLY AND DISABLED MOUNTAINVIEW TOWERS HIGHRISE BUILDING. THE PHA WILL CONTINUE TO TRY TO IMPROVE THIS AREA OF OUR OPERATIONS.

THE PHA WAS APPROVED FOR A FAMILY SELF-SUFFICIENCY

PROGRAM IN OCTOBER 2003. A FAMILY SELF-SUFFICIENCY

COORDINATOR HAS BEEN EMPLOYED WITH A GOAL OF SIGNING SELF-SUFFICIENCY CONTRACTS WITH AT LEAST 25 FAMILIES. THE PHA WILL ALSO PROVIDE A HOMEOWNERSHIP PROGRAM.

THE PHA IS TAKING BIDS FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF A PHA OWNED SECTION 8 DUPLEX PROPERTY. RENTAL INCOME FROM EXISTING PHA OWNED SECTION 8 RENTAL PROPERTY WILL BE USED TO RETIRE THE DEBT SERVICE.
