Provide a safe and secure environment in the Madison County Housing Authority's public housing developments. *Within the past year we have installed an elaborate security camera system at 3 of our Public Housing complexes, upgraded and installed lighting, trimmed trees, bushes and overgrown areas throughout MCHA's property.*
2. Improve resident and community perception of safety and security in the Madison County Housing Authority's public housing developments. *Within the past year, several positive stories have been published in the local media regarding MCHA. For the upcoming year MCHA plans to designate the Braner Homes development for elderly residents only.*
3. Expand the range and quality of housing choices available to participants in the Madison County Housing Authority's tenant-based assistance program. *On March 4, 2004 the ground breaking took place on our mixed finance project and construction is underway.*
4. Assist our community increase the availability of affordable, suitable housing for families in the very-low income range, cited as a need in our Consolidated Plan.
5. Enhance the appeal of the Madison County Housing Authority's public housing units. *Within the past year MCHA has tightened security throughout our complexes, ridding corners & other areas of drug dealers. We also utilized the Madison County Sheriff's SWAP to clear several areas, considered eyesores, of brush and debris.*
6. Make public housing the affordable housing of choice for the very low-income residents of our community. *In November 2003 MCHA reopened the Section 8 waiting list and received over 1,000 applications.*
7. Maintain the Madison County Housing Authority's real estate in a decent condition *Within the past year MCHA has implemented 2 mobile maintenance units that travel county wide. This is above and beyond our regular maintenance program*
8. Deliver timely and high quality maintenance service to the residents of the Madison County Housing Authority. *Within the past year all of MCHA's maintenance staff received training and testing from South Western Illinois College ranking their strengths and weaknesses and allowing our agency to utilize its staff more efficiently.*
9. Use the tenant-based assistance program to expand housing opportunities beyond areas of traditional low-income and minority concentration.
10. Operate the Madison County Housing Authority in full compliance with all Equal Opportunity laws and regulations.
11. Ensure full compliance with all applicable standards and regulations including generally accepted accounting practices.
12. Reduce dependency on federal funding.
13. Enhance the image of public housing in our community. *Within the past year MCHA has completed 2 demolition projects, broke ground on Washington Avenue Apartments-our mixed finance project and worked one on one with the residents on a monthly basis to address their needs & concerns.*
14. Improve economic opportunity (self-sufficiency) for the families and individuals who reside in our housing. *Currently MCHA has approximately 150 participants in our Family Self Sufficiency Program.*

ii. Executive Summary of the Annual PHA Plan

[24 CFR Part 903.7 9 (r)]

Madison County Housing Authority has prepared this Agency Plan in compliance with Section 511 of the Quality Housing and Work Responsibility Act of 1998 and the ensuing HUD requirements.

Madison County Housing Authority's objective is to provide financially stable, safe, sanitary, decent and affordable housing to those who are eligible for assistance and have demonstrated their willingness and ability to adhere to the terms of a landlord/tenant lease.

During the past year the MCHA has accomplished a number of projects which continue to improve our overall operations and which will also lead to improvement of the quality of housing and services offered to our residents.

Our mixed finance development project has met a number of milestones this past year including approval of the predevelopment agreements, approval of the proposals and evidentiaries and the ground breaking on March 4, 2004.

Consistent with our Mission Statement and while working towards the HUD Strategic Goals, Madison County Housing Authority has established the following goals:

Goal One: Increase the availability of decent, safe, and affordable housing by replacing obsolete or unmarketable housing units with new energy efficient units designed for low maintenance

1. Madison County Housing Authority has submitted an application to HUD for demolition and disposition of 100 obsolete units at **IL 15-8 Sullivan Homes**, Alton, IL. We are pursuing a

mixed finance project similar to the successful mixed finance project currently under construction at the recently demolished Grenzer Homes site.

Madison County Housing Authority has received financial assistance from the City of Alton for the fees associated with the procurement of the professional housing consultant services and for the actual demolition of the site. Our agency will absorb the costs of the abatement, environmental issues, and tipping fees. We also received funding assistance for relocation activities through Madison County Community Development.

2. Madison County Housing Authority has submitted an application to HUD for the disposition of **IL 15-09 Venice Homes**. The Illinois Department of Transportation has approached us for the purchase of 0.0536 acres and a temporary easement consisting of 0.0627 acres at this location. The purpose of this land acquisition is for IDOT to relocate Illinois Route 3. We intend to sell that portion of the property to IDOT. The remaining land at the Venice Homes site will be redeveloped through a mixed finance project. We will develop housing for the elderly only along with supportive services.
3. Madison County Housing Authority has submitted an application to HUD for complete demolition of obsolete units at **IL 15-04 Curran Homes**, Alton, IL. We are pursuing two redevelopment options for this site. 1. Multiphase demolition of the site. This will allow us to relocate residents from the Sullivan Homes complex, lessen the density, and reduce maintenance burden and costs or, 2. Total demolition of the site in conjunction with the Sullivan Homes site allowing for multiphase reconstruction. Our goal is to rebuild the site with fewer units, lessening the density, through a mixed finance project. We have received financial commitment from The City of Alton to provide the demolition services. Our agency will absorb the costs associated with the abatement, environmental issues, and tipping fees.
4. MCHA is currently working on a demolition application to HUD for the partial demolition of 6 obsolete units-(1 building) at **IL 15-07 Lee Wright Homes**. This building is beyond repair and has become a maintenance burden. We will also dispose of a small section of the Lee Wright Homes property, located near the property line of an adjacent church. The church is in need of the property and is serves no useful purpose for our agency.
5. Build a maintenance warehouse facility at our Central Office location in Collinsville.

Goal Two: Manage the Madison County Housing Authority's existing Public Housing Program and Section 8 Program in an efficient and effective manner thereby qualifying as at least a standard performer.

Objectives:

- MCHA will update its Admissions and Continued Occupancy Plan and Administrative Plans as follows:

1. MCHA will change the minimum rent in Public Housing from \$1 to \$25.00
2. MCHA will adopt the Earned Income Disallowance policy for Public Housing
3. MCHA will update its Verification Procedures for Income and Rent Determinations

4. MCHA will adopt the following policy for residents in Public Housing who report zero income status: *"In cases where annual income cannot be projected for a 12 month period, or the Resident is reporting no income and the Resident has chosen the percentage of income rent option, the Madison County Housing Authority will schedule special rent reviews every sixty (60) days for the purpose of verifying non-cash contributions. The Madison County Housing Authority has elected to have the Resident complete Madison County Housing Authority's Zero Income Checklist and Worksheet."*
5. MCHA will adopt a Reasonable Accommodation Policy and Pest Control Policy
 - MCHA will make the following changes to the Section 8 Administration Plan
 1. MCHA will change the minimum rent from \$25.00 to \$50.00
 2. MCHA will change the "Grounds for Denial or Termination of Assistance"
 3. MCHA has updated the "Madison County Housing Authority Verification Procedures for Income and Rent Determination"
 4. MCHA will adopt the Earned Income Disallowance for Persons with Disabilities
 - To meet the housing and supportive services needs of our elderly families, Madison County Housing Authority has elected to submit an application to HUD to designate the IL-015-011 Braner Homes for occupancy by elderly persons or families only.

Goal Three: Madison County Housing Authority will be pursuing the necessary steps in order to participate in the IDHA Capital Fund Bond pool.

Objectives:

1. Madison County Housing Authority will perform a physical needs assessment of all of its properties showing projected capital needs and will develop an Annual and 5 year Action Plan to address its Capital Improvements.
2. Madison County Housing Authority will identify the projects to be financed with the proceeds of the Bonds and revise our current 1 year plan and 5 year plan to reflect these along with the estimated debt service on the Bonds.

Goal Four: Recognize Residents as our ultimate customer

Objectives:

1. Hold quarterly meetings with residents of each complex in order to maintain open communications, resolve issues and address concerns and complaints.
2. Promote self-sufficiency of the residents by promoting employment and job skills training.
3. Improve on FYE 12/31/03 RASS survey scores.

MCHA has included in this plan, in accordance with Public Housing Assessment System regulations, a Resident Assessment Follow-up Plan to address deficiencies in our survey scores for the FYE 12/31/03 Customer Satisfaction Survey.

Mixed-Finance Summary:

Madison County Housing Authority affirms that shelter is a basic human necessity and we are dedicated to provide decent housing opportunities to those in need in Madison County, IL. We understand that blighted areas undermine the vibrancy of our community and therefore we are committed to acting as a means for successful redevelopment efforts in our community. We are currently in the strategic planning stage of a mixed finance development project for IL06P015-08 Sullivan Homes and IL06P015-04 Curran Homes. Our goal is to leverage our Capital Fund Program dollars with private and other public financing to redevelop these sites.

The ultimate purpose of redevelopment is the revitalization of blighted areas. Madison County Housing Authority has determined that these complexes are blighted areas. Both complexes, located in Alton, IL, are suffering from structural dilapidation, obsolescence, faulty arrangement and design, obsolete layout and other factors that are detrimental to the safety, health, morals and welfare of its community.

Sullivan Homes currently has a eighty nine percent vacancy rate with numerous long-term vacancies dating back as far as 1984. Curran Homes currently has a fifty three percent vacancy rate with numerous long-term vacancies dating back as far as 1995

There is a major crime problem in and around the vicinity of these public housing complexes. Some residents are afraid to leave their homes after dark while others are engaging in illegal drug activities.

We feel that the redevelopment of these complexes will, at a minimum, address the following:

- A chance to increase the opportunities for the physical, social, and economic integration of our public housing stock.
- Creation of a safer, more peaceful environment within these public housing complexes so that residents and surrounding neighborhoods can benefit from decreased criminal and drug-related activity, thereby enjoying a higher quality of living conditions.

- Reduction of current turnover in residents in order to improve stability within the neighborhood and increase resident involvement and pride in their neighborhood.
- Establish Madison County Housing Authority as a catalyst for residents to become more self-sufficient, which will lead to home ownership and increased family strength and stability.

Madison County Housing Authority has submitted Demolition/Disposition Applications to obtain HUD approval to demolish Sullivan Homes and Curran Homes .

Along with the redevelopment of the above complexes, Madison County Housing Authority also intends to redevelop the recently demolished Venice Homes site. Pets will be permitted at projects for families, which include Garesche, Viola Jones, Lee Wright, Venice Homes, Curran, Sullivan and Northgate Homes.

Any resident who wishes to own a pet must file a Pet Registration Application with the Complex's Manager at their respective complex. The registration will include the following:

Current license, Certification of Inoculation, Verification that the pet has been spayed or neutered, Information to identify pet and establish that it is a common household pet, Name, Address & Phone number of at least one responsible party to care for the animal should the owner become unable to take care of the animal.

Resident must have approval from MCHA before animal is brought onto the premises. A pet reference from current landlord, if applicable, may be required, as well as home visit from MCHA's management to evaluate the animal.

The Pet Registration Form will be reviewed annually for continued renewal. At the time of resident's annual re-certification, all certifications and licensing as required by the Pet Registration Form will be re-verified.

Approved applications will be assigned a decal to be placed in a visible location indicating a pet lives in the unit. Residents failing to comply with these procedures could face termination of their Dwelling Lease.

In addition to the Pet Registration, the following rules will apply to pet ownership:

1. Limit one (1) common household pet per Resident.
2. Animal must wear a collar indicating owner's name, address and phone number and a current license tag must be displayed. (all license tags expire one year from date of issuance).
3. The weight of animal may not exceed thirty (30) pounds at adulthood.
4. Cats must be de-clawed.
5. Animal must be controlled by an adult and on a leash when outside the resident's apartment.
6. Animal must be secured or caged in the apartment when MCHA's Maintenance or Management personnel are in the resident's apartment. Dogs and cats must be secured or caged in the resident's apartment when resident is not at home.
7. Pet owners are responsible for keeping their apartment in clean, safe and sanitary condition and are liable for any damages or infestation to apartment. If damages or infestation occurs to the apartment the resident will be charged.
8. Apartments with animals will be inspected every six (6) months.
9. All pet owners are required to keep a cleanup device for animal waste, Litter boxes

must be cleaned frequently to keep the apartment free from undesirable animal odors.

10. The pet owner is responsible for picking up waste left by the pet and disposing of it in a dumpster or other designated area on MCHA's property. The pet owner must use the designated "pet walk" and avoid traveled areas, trees and shrubs for the pet to relieve itself.
11. The resident must not alter the apartment, patio, or outside area to provide an enclosure for the animal.
12. MCHA will be held harmless should your pet bite, attack, or otherwise injure another resident, visitors or MCHA staff member.
13. No animal will be permitted to remain in a resident's apartment that causes excessive noise that disrupts the peace of other residents.
14. Animals found unattended and/or without a leash shall be turned over to the Animal Control Authorities.
15. Any resident who receives three (3) complaint letters regarding violations of the Pet Policy will be required to permanently remove the animal from the premises with **no exceptions**. Three (3) violations of the Pet Policy could also result in the eviction of the resident/pt owner.

MCHA encourages those residents who reside in pet-authorized locations to establish a Pet Association. The association would deal with pet-related issues/complaints and monitor reported violations of the regulations.

Nothing in these regulation will prohibit MCHA or an appropriate community authority from requiring the removal of any animal form the complex if the animal's conduct or condition is duly determined to constitute, under the provisions of state and local law, a nuisance or a threat to the health, safety and peace of another resident of the complex or other persons in the community where the complex is located.

Furthermore, in the event of an emergency, MCHA reserves the right to remove any animal that constitutes an immediate threat to health or safety.

Madison County Housing Authority Resident Assessment Follow-up Plan

In accordance with the Public Housing Assessment System regulations; the purpose of this plan is to address deficiencies in our survey score for the 12/31/03 FYE Customer Satisfaction Survey.

Our agency scored less than 75% in the following areas:

Communication	64%
Safety	71%
Housing Development Appearance	63%

In an effort to improve these scores Madison County Housing Authority has accomplished the following:

Communication:

1. Resident meetings are held once a month at the Braner Homes, May Building, Olin Building, Stevens Building, Sullivan Homes, Curran Homes, Lee Wright Homes, and Viola Jones Homes.

The Executive Director, Housing Manager, Director of Management and Quality Control Coordinator attend the meetings. The purpose of the meetings is to obtain resident feedback.

These meetings began in April 2004 and are conducted monthly. The meetings are informal and open to participation from any public housing resident.. They are generally well attended by the residents.

The Housing Authority welcomes the residents concerns, complaints, questions, and requests. The information obtained at the meetings is shared with MCHA staff and when appropriate; deficiencies are corrected, issues are addressed, recommendations are made, and requests are answered.

2. The Housing Authority instituted two feedback forms (1) Suspected Lease Violations Reporting Form and (2) Suspected Drug Activity Report. These forms were issued to all residents of public housing and are available at Management Offices and the Central Office. The purpose of the forms is to obtain information from the residents in a non-threateningly way. The residents are not asked to sign the form when they log a complaint.
3. All Madison County Housing Authority's personnel wear Identification Badges so the residents can properly identify them.

SAFETY

1. Madison County Housing Authority (MCHA) has installed a "state of the art" security camera system at the Garesche Homes, Viola Jones Homes, and Lee Wright Homes complexes. The cameras are monitored by the local police department, Madison Police Department, and have been instrumental in eliminating some of the drug trafficking in these areas.
2. MCHA has upgraded street lighting and installed new directional lighting in several areas through- out our housing stock.
3. MCHA holds monthly resident feedback meetings (see Communication-Paragraph 1).
4. MCHA instituted two new forms for resident use (see Communication-Paragraph 2) to report lease violations and drug activity.

5. MCHA has issued parking permits to all residents and employees and has designated several parking lots as "Resident Only Parking".
6. MCHA is preparing a policy to institute a requirement for all residents to carry Resident Identification Badges.
7. MCHA has upgraded the security entrance systems at the Olin Building and Braner Building-two high-rise complexes

NEIGHBORHOOD APPEARANCE

1. Madison County Housing Authority's maintenance staff works diligently to keep the building grounds free of trash. We have undertaken an aggressive approach in charging problem residents with the abuse and neglect of their units and grounds.
2. Within the past six months, MCHA has completed demolition of two complexes (Venice Homes and Grenzer Homes) that were obsolete and designed in a manner that conflicts with the principles of New Urbanism.
3. MCHA has two demolition applications currently on file at our Chicago Field Office. These applications, when approved, will allow us to demolish and redevelop an additional two developments in the Alton area.
4. MCHA is taking aggressive measures to ready vacant units.
5. MCHA holds monthly meetings with the residents and addresses their complaints regarding the overall appearance of their complexes.
6. MCHA has installed security window screens at Garesche Homes and Lee Wright Homes. This has resulted in a decline in the number of broken/boarded up windows and has greatly improved overall curb appeal.
7. MCHA has removed an area of overgrown brush and trimmed trees that were a safety concern of the residents of Lee Wright Homes
8. In the future, MCHA will be removing the trash dumpsters from Lee Wright Homes; replacing them with individual trash containers placed at the rear of the resident apartments. Our goal is to accomplish this no later than August 2005.
9. MCHA, with the assistance of the City of Madison, has pruned all of the trees in the Garesche Homes and Lee Wright Homes areas and is currently working at Viola Jones Homes site. We also cleared a brushy, woody area behind Lee Wright Homes that was a security concern.

9.4 DECONCENTRATION POLICY

It is Madison County Housing Authority's policy to provide for deconcentration of poverty and encourage income mixing by bringing higher income families into lower income developments and lower income families into higher income developments. Toward this end, we will skip families on the waiting list to reach other families with a lower or higher income. We will accomplish this in a uniform and non-discriminating manner.

Madison County Housing Authority will affirmatively market our housing to all eligible income groups. Lower income residents will not be steered toward lower income developments and higher income people will not be steered toward higher income developments.

Prior to the beginning of each fiscal year, we will analyze the income levels of families residing in each of our developments, the income levels of census tracts in which our developments are located, and the income levels of the families on the waiting list. Based on this analysis, we will determine the level of marketing strategies and deconcentration incentives to implement. The worksheet for the analysis can be found in **Appendix 1** of the Authority's Admissions and Continued Occupancy Plan.

ATTACHMENT C

DEFINITION OF "SUBSTANTIAL DEVIATION" AND "SIGNIFICANT AMENDMENT OR MODIFICATION"

Madison County Housing Authority has defined Substantial Deviation of Annual Plans from the 5 Year Plan and Significant Amendment or Modification of the Annual Plan as follows:

- changes to rent or admissions policies or organization of the waiting list;
- additions of non-emergency work items (items not included in the current Annual Statement or 5 Year Action Plan) or change in use of replacement reserve funds under the Capital Fund;
- and any change with regard to demolition or disposition, designation, homeownership programs or conversion activities.

ATTACHMENT D

Madison County Housing Authority Community Service Policy

Section 512 of the Quality Housing and Work Responsibility Act of 1998, which amends Section 12 of the Housing Act of 1937, establishes a new requirement for non-exempt residents of public housing to contribute eight (8) hours of community service each month or to participate in a self-sufficiency program for eight (8) hours each month. Community service is a service for which individuals are not paid. Madison County Housing Authority (herein referred to as PHA) believes that the community service requirement should not be perceived by the resident to be a punitive or demeaning activity, but rather to be a rewarding activity that will benefit both the resident and the community. Community service offers public housing residents an opportunity to contribute to the communities that support them.

In order to implement this new requirement effectively, Madison County Housing Authority establishes the following Policy, October 1, 1999.

1. Community Service

The PHA will provide residents, identified as required to participate in community service, a variety of voluntary activities and location where the activities can be performed. The activities may include, but are not limited to:

- Improving the physical environment of the residents developments;
- Cleaning offices.
- Volunteer services in local schools, day care centers, hospital, nursing homes, youth or senior organizations, drug/alcohol treatment enters, recreation centers, etc;
- Neighborhood projects;
- Self-improvement activities such as household budget, credit counseling, English proficiency, GED classes or other educational activities;
- Tutoring elementary or high school age residents; and
- Helping on-site computer training centers.

Voluntary political activities are prohibited.

2. Program Administration

The PHA may administer its own community service program in conjunction with the formation of cooperative relationships with other community based entities such as TANF, Social Services Agencies or other organizations which have as their goal, the improvement and advancement of disadvantaged families. The PHA may seek to contract its community service program out to a third party.

In conjunction with its own or partnership program, the PHA will provide reasonable accommodations for accessibility to persons with disabilities. The PHA will provide a directory of supervise community service activities and may develop and provide a directory of opportunities from which residents may select. When services are provided through partnering agencies, the PHA will confirm the resident's participation. Should contracting out the community service function be determined to be the most efficient method for the PHA to accomplish this requirement, the PHA will monitor the agency for contract compliance.

The PHA will assure that the service is not labor that would normally be performed by PHA employees responsible for the essential maintenance and property services.

3. Self-Sufficiency

The PHA will inform residents that participation in self-sufficiency activities for eight (8) hours each month can satisfy the community service requirement and encourage non-exempt residents to select such activities to satisfy the requirement. Such activities can include, but are not limited to:

- Apprenticeships and job readiness training;
- Substance abuse and mental health counseling and treatment;
- English proficiency, GED, adult education, junior college or other formal education;
- Household budgeting and credit counseling;
- Small business training.

The PHA may sponsor its own economic self-sufficiency program or coordinate with local social services, volunteer organizations and TANF agencies.

4. Geographic Location

The PHA recognizes that the intent of this requirement is to have residents provide service to their own communities, either in the PHA's developments or in the broader community in which the PHA operates.

5. Exemptions

In accordance with provisions in the Act, the PHA will exempt from participation in community service requirements the following groups;

- Adults who are 62 years of age or older;
- Persons engaged in work activities as defined under Social Security (full-time or part-time employment);
- Participants in a welfare to work program;
- Persons receiving assistance form and in compliance with State programs funded under part A, title IV of the Social Security Act; and
- The disabled but only to the extent that the disability makes the person "unable to comply" with the community service requirements.

The PHA will determine, at the next regularly scheduled reexamination, the status of each household member eighteen (18) years of age or older with respect to the requirement to participate in community service activities. The PHA will use the "PHA Family Community Service Monthly Time-Sheet" to document resident eligibility and the hours of community service. A record for each adult will be established and community service placement selections made. Each non-exempt household member will be provided with forms to be completed by a representative of the service or economic self-sufficiency activity verifying the hours of volunteer service conducted each month.

The PHA will also assure that procedures are in place which provide residents the opportunity to change status with respect to the community service requirement. Such changes include, but are not limited to:

- Going from unemployment to employment;
- Entering a job training program;
- Entering an educational program which exceeds eight (8) hours monthly.

All exemptions to the community service requirement will be verified and documented in the resident file. Required verifications may include, but not be limited to:

- Third-party verification of employment, enrollment in a training or education program, welfare to work program or other economic self sufficiency activities;
- Birth certificates to verify age 62 or older; or
- If appropriate, verification of disability limitations.

Families who pay flat rents, live in public housing units within market rate developments or families who are over income when they initially occupy a public housing unit will not receive an automatic exception.

6. Cooperative Relationships with Welfare Agencies

The PHA may initiate cooperative relationships with local service agencies that provide assistance to its families to facilitate information exchange, expansion of community service/self-sufficiency program options and aid in the coordination of those activities.

7. Lease Requirements and Documentation

The PHA's lease has a twelve (12) -month term and is automatically renewable except for non-compliance with the community service requirement. The lease also provides for termination and eviction of the entire household for such non-compliance. The lease provisions will be implemented for current residents at the next regularly scheduled reexamination on or after January 1, 2001, and for all new residents effective January 1, 2001. The PHA will not renew or extend the if the household contains a non-exempt member who has failed to comply with the community service requirement.

Documentation of compliance or non-compliance will be placed in each resident file.

8. Non-compliance

If the PHA determines that a resident who is not an "exempt individual" has not complied with the community service requirement, the PHA must notify the resident:

1. of the non-compliance;
2. that the determination is subject to the PHA's administrative grievance procedure;
3. that unless the resident enters into an agreement under paragraph 4. Of this section the lease of the family of which the non-compliant adult is a member may not be renewed. However, if the non-compliant adult moves from the unit, the lease may be renewed;
4. that before the expiration of the lease term, the PHA must offer the resident an opportunity to cure the non-compliance during the next twelve (12)- month period; such a cure includes a written agreement by the non-compliant adult to complete as many additional hours of community service or economic self-sufficiency activity needed to make up the total number of hours required over the twelve (12)-month term of the lease.

ADDENDUM TO
THE SECTION 8 ADMINISTRATION PLAN 2005

Earned Income Disallowance For Persons With Disabilities

- .. This disallowance applies to participants in the Section 8 program-it does not apply for purposes of admission to the program.
- .. Initially, HUD defined “qualified family” as a disabled family receiving Section 8 assistance whose annual income increased due to one of the reasons listed below, which meant that only families whose head, spouse or co-head was disabled could qualify for the disallowance.
- .. Effective March 15, 2002, families are no longer required to meet the definition of disabled family in order to qualify for the disallowance. A “qualified family” is a family receiving Section 8 assistance whose annual income increases due to one of the following reasons.
 1. Employment of a family member who is a person with disabilities, AND was previously unemployed for one or more years prior to employment.
 - . NOTE: HUD’s definition of “previously unemployed” includes a person who has earned, in the 12 months prior to employment, not more than would have been earned at the established minimum wage working 10 hours per week for 50 weeks.
 2. Increased earnings by a family member who is a person with disabilities, AND is a participant in any economic self-sufficiency or job-training program.
 3. New employment or increased earnings by a family member who is a person with disabilities, AND within the past 6 months, has received assistance, benefits or services under any state program for temporary assistance (TANF, Welfare-to-Work)
 - . Not limited to cash assistance
 - . Includes one-time payments, wage subsidies, transportation assistance
 - . Total amount over a six-month period must be at least \$500.00

Initial 12-Month Full Exclusion

- . Begins on the date the family members (with disabilities) :
 - is employed; or
 - first experiences and increase in income due to employment.

- . The full amount of increase is excluded, and the exclusion extends for a total of twelve cumulative months.

Second 12-Month Exclusion and Phase-in

- . Begins when the family member has received 12 cumulative months of full exclusion. Fifty percent of any increase is excluded. The exclusion extends for a total of twelve cumulative months.

Lifetime Maximum Four Year Disallowance

- . The initial full exclusion is applied for a maximum of twelve cumulative months. The phase-in (50%) exclusion is applied for a maximum of twelve cumulative months.
- . The family member may start and stop employment and the exclusion may start and stop during a 48-month period beginning on the date of the initial exclusion.
- . No exclusion may be given after the 48-month period, regardless of whether the family member has received the full exclusion for a total of 12 months **or** the phase-in exclusion for a total of 12 months.

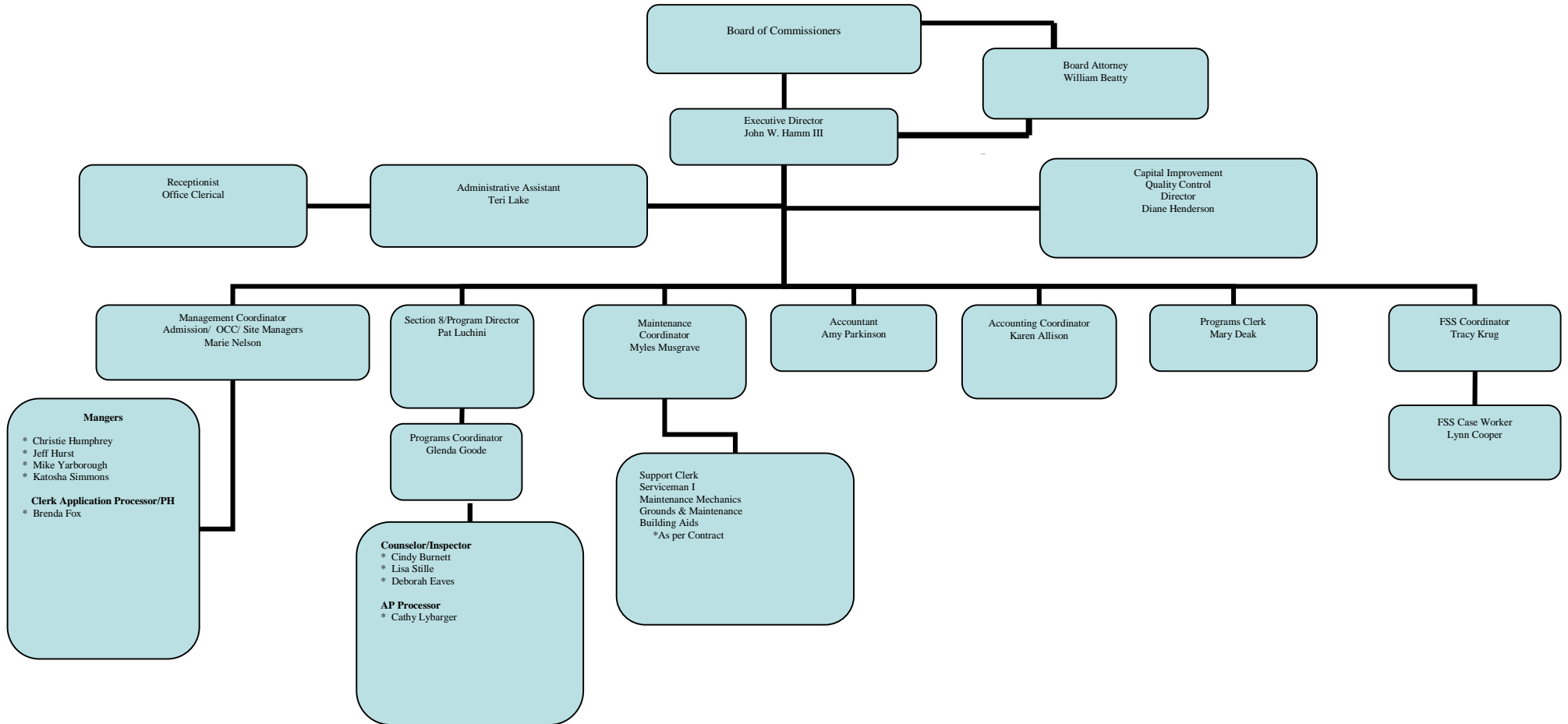

Madison County Housing Authority will verify income through the following methods:

- 1. UPFRONT INCOME VERIFICATION**
- 2. WRITTEN THIRD PARTY VERIFICATION**
- 3. ORAL THIRD PARTY VERIFICATIONS**
- 4. TENANT DECLARATION**

Madison County Housing Authority will obtain Upfront Income Verification through the following methods:

1. Computer monitoring agreements with Federal, State or Local Government agency or private agency.
2. Use of HUD's Tenant Assessment Subsystem (TASS); or
3. Submit direct request for income verifications to a federal, state or local government agencies, or a private agency.

Types of Income that will be verified using Upfront income verifications (UIV)

1. Gross wages and salaries (including overtime pay, commission, fees, tips, bonuses and other compensation for personal services.
2. Unemployment Compensation.
3. Welfare Benefits
4. Social Security Benefits (including Federal and State benefits, black lung benefits dual benefits)

ATTACHMENT J

Use of Written Third Party Verification to Supplement Upfront Verification

Madison County Housing Authority will use written third party verification to complement the upfront income verification. If the upfront income verification is not available or if the UIV data differs substantially from tenant-reported information this method will be used. A verification form will be mailed directly to the independent source to obtain wage information and the information will be returned directly to the Madison County Housing Authority from the independent source. If this information is not received when three attempts are made, then the Madison County Housing Authority may use the oral third party verification.

Use of Oral Third Party Verification

In the event the independent source, does not respond to the Madison County Housing Authority written request for information, the housing authority may contact the independent source by telephone to obtain the requested information.

When neither form of third party verification can be obtained, the Madison County Housing Authority may accept original documents such as consecutive pay stubs, if employed by the same employer for three months or more, W-2 forms, etc. The Madison County Housing Authority staff must document the file, stating the reason third party verification was not available.

Tenant Declaration

In the event of self -employment, when third party verification is not available, the Madison County Housing Authority will request a notarized tenant declaration.

Attachment K

MADISON COUNTY HOUSING AUTHORITY PUBLIC HOUSING EARNED INCOME DISALLOWANCE ADDENDUM TO ADMISSIONS AND CONTINUED OCCUPANCY POLICY 2005 SECTION 10.2 (ANNUAL INCOME)

Earned Income Disallowance For Persons In Public Housing

.. This disallowance applies to participants in the Public Housing Program. Applicant families are not eligible for the Earned Income Disallowance.

.. The Earned Income Disallowance calls for the exclusion of increases in income attributable to employment by the qualified family member over income received by that family member prior to qualifying for the disallowance. The exclusion applies only to the income of the qualified family member, not the entire household.

The following definition apply for the purpose of this section:

Disallowance. Exclusion from annual income. Previously unemployed includes a person who has earned, in the twelve months previous to employment, no more than would be received for 10 hours of work per week for 50 weeks at the established minimum wage.

Qualified family:

1. A family residing in public housing: whose annual income increases as a result of employment of a family member who was unemployed for one or more years previous to employment.
2. whose annual income increases as a result of increased earnings by a family member during participation in any economic self-sufficiency or other job training program; or
3. whose annual income increases, as a result of new employment or increased earnings of a family member, during or within six months after receiving assistance, benefits, or services under any state program for temporary assistance for needy families funded under part A of Title IV of the Social Security Act, as determined by the PHA in consultation with the local agencies administering temporary assistance for needy families (TANF) and Welfare -to-work (WTW) programs.

1. The TANF program is:

- . Not limited to monthly income maintenance

- . Includes one-time payments, wage subsidies, transportation assistance
- . Total amount over a six-month period must be at least \$500.00

Initial 12-Month Full Exclusion

- . Begins on the date the family members who qualifies is employed; or first experiences and increase in income due to employment.
- . The full amount of increase is excluded, and the exclusion extends for a total of 12 cumulative months.

Second 12-Month Exclusion and Phase-in

- . Begins when the qualified family member has received 12 cumulative months of full exclusion. Fifty percent of any increase is excluded. The exclusion extends for a total of 12 cumulative months.

Lifetime Maximum Four Year Disallowance

- . The initial full exclusion is applied for a maximum of 12 cumulative months. The phase-in (50%) exclusion is applied for a maximum of 12 cumulative months.
- . The family member may repeatedly start and stop employment and the exclusion may start and stop and pick up again during the 48-month period beginning on the date of the initial exclusion.
- . No exclusion may be given after the 48-month period, regardless of whether the family member has received the full exclusion for a total of 12 months **or** the phase-in exclusion for a total of 12 months.

Resident Comments and MCHA Analysis of Comments & Recommendations of the Resident
Advisory Board

Madison County Housing Authority received a letter from the Lee Wright Homes Resident Council on July 22, 2004 with comments to the 2004 Plan Submission. Below is synopsis of each comment:

- Add the following to the list of residents exempt from MCHA's Community Service Policy
 1. Caretakers of a person with a disability who has certified that based on the disability, he or she cannot comply with the requirement
 2. Members of a family receiving benefits from a State Welfare Program in compliance with the program's requirements.
- The Zero Income Checklist and Worksheet Verification of Non-cash Contributions accompanying the Policy for Residents in Public Housing Reporting Zero Income be eliminated from the Plan.
- The Homeless Preference should not be deleted from MCHA's local preferences for admission.
- The Victims of Domestic Violence should be added to MCHA's local preferences for admission.
- That #8, Neighborhood Appearance (p3 of the MCHA Resident Assessment Follow-up Plan) be deleted from the plan.

Madison County Housing Authority considered the comments and a below is a brief analysis.

1. Madison County Housing Authority(MCHA) did not change its Community Service Policy because Caretakers and residents in compliance with the State Welfare Programs are not currently affected by this policy.
2. MCHA did not eliminate adding the Zero Income Checklist and Worksheet Verification of Non-cash Contributions as an addendum to our Administrative Plan because it will be an effective tool in eliminating fraud and verifying actual tenant income.
3. The local preference points were not changed. The idea to give preference points to the Homeless and Victims of Domestic Violence is a good one, however, MCHA will continue to address the needs of these clients by providing emergency shelter through Madison County Community Development..
4. In accordance with the Public Housing Assessment System regulations, MCHA addressed the deficiencies in our survey score for FFE 2003 with the the Madison County Housing Authority Resident Assessment Follow-up Plan. # 8 under the Neighborhood Appearance section discusses MCHA's intent to remove the trash dumpsters at the Lee Wright Homes complex and replace them with individual trash containers. MCHA understands the residents concerns with the removal of the dumpsters and will continue to negotiate a workable plan with the residents of this complex.
