A. PHA Progress in Meeting the Mission and Goals Described in the 5-Year Plan

Warren Housing Authority continues the fulfillment of our mission of promoting adequate housing, economic opportunity and a suitable living environment free from discrimination.

Our Public Housing program continues to provide the community with quality housing for the elderly and disabled. The conditions of our buildings and property surpass the industry standard due to strong planning and prudent use of modernization funds. A recent U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development Section 504 Compliance Review has determined that Warren Housing Authority is in compliance with the general provisions of Section 504.

In 2004, Warren Housing Authority utilizing Capital Fund Grants, enlarged the Community Room which is currently used by the seniors and disabled of Warren and surrounding communities. The added space will allow for additional senior activities.

Additionally, the exterior clapboard vinyl siding on all Public Housing Buildings was replaced with Certainteed solid vinyl shingles.

Warren Housing Authority serves 192 families through its administration of the Department of Housing and Urban Development Housing Choice Voucher Program providing rental subsidies to families in the community. We continue to maintain 95-100 percent lease-up rate during a period of tight rental markets and increasing rents. We continue to provide voucher mobility counseling and conduct an on-going program for potential landlords which has proved to be very successful in achieving high utilization rates.

Warren Housing Authority continues to be designated by HUD as a High Performer. The PHAS score of 94 and the Rass Survey Results were very favorable indicating that we are successfully striving towards the betterment of seniors and disabled who reside at Kickemuit Village and meeting our goal to improve public housing management.
