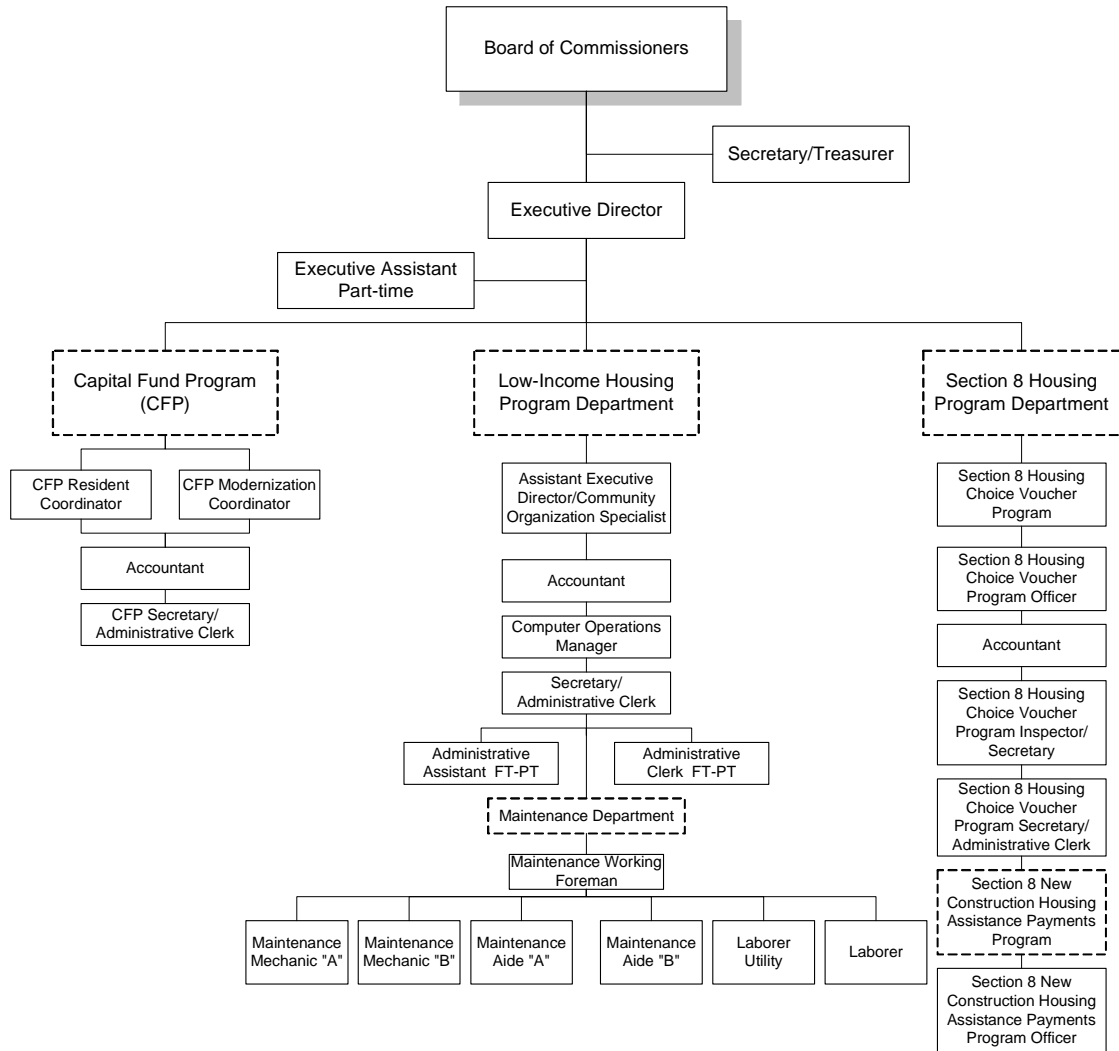

Attachment E

Resident Service and Satisfaction Survey (RASS) Follow-up Plan

Overview

Each year the Department of Housing and Urban Development mails surveys to a sample of Housing Authority residents. The residents are asked to respond to questions concerning their opinion of the Authority's performance. The survey covers five categories including maintenance, communication, safety, services and neighborhood appearance. The Housing Authority of the City of Trumann received the following scores on the Resident Assessment Survey for FY2002, FY2003, FY2004 and FY2005.

As the table above shows, the Trumann Housing Authority continues to score well in all sections of the survey. Attachment F

- Any change with regard to demolition or disposition, designation, homeownership programs or conversion activities.

Attachment G

Pet Policy

In compliance with Section 536 of the Quality Housing and Work Responsibility Act of 1998, the Housing Authority of the City of Trumann, Arkansas, will permit residents to own and keep common household pets in their units. This section of the Agency Plan provides a brief overview of the Authority's Pet Policy. The full Policy is on file at the Authority's Administrative Office.

The Policy states that prior to accepting a pet for residency, the PHA and pet owner must enter into a Pet Agreement. The Pet Agreement serves two purposes. First, it makes the pet owner aware of the rules and regulations pertaining to owning a pet on Authority property. Second, it lets Authority personnel know who has a pet in case a unit has to be entered without the resident home.

The Policy allows for mandatory provisions such as inoculations and registration.

The Policy also contains a list of pets which are permitted. This list is not inclusive and the Authority will consider other breeds as long as they fit within the types and sizes listed.

The Authority has established a Pet Deposit for cats and dogs of \$50.00. The purpose of the Pet Deposit is to pay for damages that may be caused by a pet during occupancy. The pet deposit is refundable if the tenant moves out and no damages have been incurred.

The Pet Policy also includes sanitary standards and waste disposal procedures.

Any person who is considering keeping a pet while living in an Authority dwelling unit should read the full policy to make sure that all rules are followed.

Attachment H

Community Service Policy

As a condition of continued occupancy, each adult resident of the Authority shall:

- a. Contribute eight hours per month of community service (not including political activities) within the community in which that adult resides; or
- b. Participate in an economic self-sufficiency program for eight hours per month.

Exemptions

Exemptions shall be made for any individual who:

- a. Is 62 years of age or older;
- b. Is a blind or disabled individual defined under section 216(i)(1) or 1614 of the Social Security Act (42 USC 416(i)(1); 1382c) and who is unable to comply with this section, or is a primary caretaker of such individual;
- c. Is engaged in a work activity (as such term is defined in section 407(d) of the Social Security Act (42 USC 607(d), as in effect on and after July 1, 1997);
- d. Meets the requirements for being exempted from having to engage in a work activity under the state program funded under part A of title IV of the Social Security Act (42 USC 601 et seq.) or under any other welfare program of the state in which the public housing agency is located, including a state-administered welfare-to-work program; or
- e. Is in a family receiving assistance under a state program funded under part A of title IV of the Social Security Act (42 USC 601 et seq.) or under any other welfare program of the state in which public housing agency is located, including a state administered welfare-to-work program, and has not been found by the state or other administering entity to be in noncompliance with such program.

Annual Determinations

For each public housing resident, the Authority shall review and determine the compliance of the resident with the requirements of this policy 30 days before the expiration of each lease term of the resident. Such determinations shall be made in accordance with the principles of due process and on a nondiscriminatory basis.

Noncompliance

If the Authority determines that the resident has not complied with the requirements of this policy, the resident shall be notified in writing of such noncompliance. The written notification shall state that the determination of noncompliance is subject to the administrative grievance procedure and that failure by the resident to enter into an agreement, before the expiration of the lease term, to cure any noncompliance by participating in an economic self-sufficiency program for, or contributing to community service, as many additional hours as the resident needs to comply in the aggregate with such requirement over the 12-month term of the lease, may be cause for lease termination.

The Authority shall not renew or extend any lease, or provide any new lease, for a dwelling unit for any household that includes an adult member who has been determined to be in noncompliance with the requirements of this policy and has failed to attempt to cure the noncompliance.

The PHA must offer the resident the opportunity to enter into a written agreement with the PHA to cure the noncompliance with the community service and self-sufficiency requirements either under the current or delinquent lease. The agreement should include:

- The additional number of hours of community service or self-sufficiency work activities needed to make up the required number of hours under the current lease.
- Assurance that all members of the family who are subject to these requirements are in compliance with the requirements.
- Written assurances satisfactory to the PHA that any noncompliant resident no longer resides in the unit.

Location of the Community Service Program

The Authority may provide a community service or an economic self-sufficiency program to meet the requirements of this policy. However, the Authority shall not substitute participation in community service or an economic self-sufficiency program for work performed by an employee, or supplant a job at any location at which community work requirements are fulfilled.

Administration

The Authority may contract the administration of the Community Service and Work Requirement Program to a qualified agency as needed.
