- Outcome: During the past five years the HRA of Bemidji increased its occupancy rate and unit turn around time significantly. During FY 09 the occupancy rate was 99.98%. We have been maintaining that rate to this day.

- Outcome: See objective 1.
- Objective: Other: Apply for Shelter + Care & Bridges funding.
- Outcome: See objective 1.
- PHA Goal: Improve the quality of assisted housing

- Outcome: In FY 2008 the PHA raised its PHA score from 79 to 89.
- Objective: Improve voucher management (SEMAP)
- Outcome: This score has remained about the same. The Family Self-Sufficiency program had never been implemented since additional vouchers were received in 1993, resulting in loss of points. The current management was unaware of these additional vouchers and is now implementing policy to start this program.

Objective: Increase customer satisfaction by improving management and renovating or modernizing public housing units.

Outcome: This goal has been met. Tenants are happy, houses are renovated, energy efficiency windows were installed keeping energy costs down; voucher unit inspections are resulting in more satisfied clients due to keeping units in good condition. Landlords are provided with guidance to assist them in maintaining their units.

PHA Goal: Increase assisted housing choices:

- Objective: Provide voucher mobility counseling by conducting outreach efforts to potential voucher landlords.
- Outcome: The HRA has greatly expanded the landlords in the community who are willing to participate in the HCV program. This has resulted in better quality housing options to our clientele.
- Objective: Implement voucher, public housing or other homeownership programs:

Outcome: The HRA has not pursued this option. It was a goal of former management, however, the HRA does not have the funds to pursue this at present time as staffing workloads are too great to add more.

PHA Goal: Provide an improved living environment:

Objective: Implement public housing security improvements.

Outcome: The HRA has installed security cameras throughout Northland Apartments. This has resulted in peace of mind for tenants and has provided law enforcement with the means to identify perpetrators of crimes in our building resulting in numerous convictions.

PHA Goal: Promote self-sufficiency and asset development of assisted households:

- Objective: Increase the number and percentage of employed persons in assisted families by providing or attracting supportive services to improve assistance recipients' employability and to increase independence for the elderly or families with disabilities.
- Outcome: The HRA has developed extremely close working relationships and memorandums of understanding with Beltrami County Human Services, Bi-County Community Action Program, Minnesota CEP, Hope House, Red Lake Homeless Shelter, Evergreen House, House of Hospitality Shelter to mention a few. These liaisons have resulted in increased opportunities, counseling and goals to meet this objective.

PHA Goal: Ensure Equal Opportunity and affirmatively further fair housing:

- Objective: Undertake affirmative measures to ensure access to assisted housing, provide a suitable living environment for families living in assisted housing and to ensure accessible housing regardless of race, color, religion, national origin, sex, familial status and disability.
- Outcome: The HRA advocates in the community on a regular basis for fair housing. The HRA actively promotes fair housing through discussions with landlords, participation in roundtable discussions with legislators, participation in the NWCOC, providing comments on legislation, working with service organizations to locate housing for clientele, etc.
