Include statements related to these programs as applicable.</p> <p><i>Prince William Office of Housing and Community Development continues to operate the Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) Homeownership option, which began on a pilot basis in 2005. The program has had careful and modest growth, currently assisting eight (8) current families, having served a total of eleven (11) families since its inception. As of the writing of this report, three (3) families are in various stages of preparation to enter the program.</i></p> <p><i>The program guidelines administered by OHCD require that the family present sufficient funds for down payment and closing costs (an average of 3-6%); and that the financing for the purchase of a home using the homeownership voucher option be provided, insured or guaranteed by the state or Federal government. When not possible to meet the financing criteria, the loan must conform to generally accepted private sector underwriting standards. Subprime lending underwriting standards are considered unacceptable as they often allow excessive debt to income ratios that put the participant at a disproportionate risk for default. Homeownership education is a key component.</i></p> <p><i>OHCD continues to develop the HCV Homeownership program through, and beyond, the pilot stage, and will continue to market the program to those families with higher annual incomes that can afford homeownership, but who may not be aware of this option.</i></p>

(a) Progress in Meeting Mission and Goals.

Prince William County has made significant progress in the following HUD Strategic goals:

I. Increase the availability of decent, safe, and affordable housing.

II. Promote self-sufficiency and asset development of families and individuals.

III. Ensure Equal Opportunity in Housing for All Americans

Within each of these strategic goals, we have made progress on several PHA goals as detailed below:

I. Increase the availability of decent, safe and affordable housing.

PHA Goal – Expand the supply of assisted housing by:

Apply for additional vouchers: To reducing the time of Housing Choice Voucher Waiting List Application.

Progress Report: *During the prior reporting period OHCD focused on leasing the special purpose vouchers that were awarded October 2010. As a result of working with our community partners and other county agency partners OHCD was able to fully lease the 50 Family Unification Program (FUP) vouchers and 70 non-elderly, disabled (NED) vouchers by December 31st, 2011. OHCD continues to work with PWC's Community Services agency, Department of Social Services (DSS), Independence Empowerment Center (IEC) and Trillium Drop-In-Center all of whom provide continued assistance for disabled families.*

OHCD will continue to explore applying for additional vouchers in this reporting period and future years should HUD make them available.

Leverage private or other public funds to create additional housing opportunities: Develop relationships with the Virginia Housing Development Authority, OHCD's HOME Office and local Nonprofit Organizations to identify funds and/or services available to HVC participants.

Progress Report: *OHCD has been able to establish a new relationship during the previous reporting period with Bank of America, and will continue its relationship with SunTrust Bank as a supporter of the homeownership voucher program. Through the Family Self-Sufficiency Program, relationships have been established with Northern Virginia Community College, George Mason University, and the Northern Virginia SkillSource center. OHCD partnered with the Independent Empowerment Center (IEC) and Trillium Inc. who was contracted by the PWC Community Services agency to assist their clients to locate units; and, both agencies worked directly with our disabled applicants in locating a unit and provided case management along with other assistance.*

OHCD's Rental Assistance Office will continue its relationship with all of the entities listed above. HCV families have been provided Home Ownership Assistance, credit counseling, and additional units have been made available to HCV families through the Rental Rehab Project and Housing Preservation & Development Fund projects. Rental Assistance Staff continue to assist at the OHCD Home Office during its Homeownership Fair, and community representatives continue to be members of the Family Self-Sufficiency Program Coordinating Committee.

PHA Goal – Improve the quality of assisted housing by:

Improving voucher management and increasing customer satisfaction: OHCD will accomplish this by moving agency to a Non-Troubled Agency; and by publishing a semi-annual agency newsletter. In addition, improve Financial Procedures and SEMAP Quality Control Procedures to ensure OHCD is operating within HUD's guidelines.

Progress Report: *OHCD continues to improve its operation of the HCV program. OHCD maintained its High Performer SEMAP Rating for FY2011. The Rental Assistance Office continues the individual interviews to complete the recertification process. OHCD continues to implement HUD's EIV and Income verification requirements more efficiently. OHCD continues to provide a Housing and Related County Services Guide, which provides families with information on local schools, emergency services, and other housing related information. We, as an agency, continue to utilize surveys to measure customer satisfaction; our receptionist area and monthly Owner surveys continue to have increased our rates from 89% to 93% approval. Staff continues to look at ways to better serve our families. As an example: OHCD's Rental Assistance Office reorganized its Intake and Occupancy Teams to provide better management and oversight of program activities. We are also expanding some of our Family Self-Sufficiency program activities to all HCV participants in an effort to increase self-sufficiency program wide.*

OHCD continues to upgrade Housing Pro as upgrades become available. The newest upgrade was Housing Pro 8.0.2 in February 2012. Some of the new features are a redesigned system that offers a new voucher tracking system, enhanced security features, and improvements in various areas of the system designed to increase user friendliness.

<p>10.0 Cont.</p>	<p>PHA Goal – Increase assisted housing choices by:</p> <p>Providing HCV voucher holders with information regarding mobility. Conduct outreach efforts to potential voucher landlords and conduct additional outreach as required. Increase voucher payments upon annual review and implement voucher homeownership program.</p> <p><i>Progress Report:</i> OHCD continues to provide mobility information at voucher issuance and recertification briefings. OHCD continues to provide participants with information regarding public schools, transportation; and, other public service information is made available at our receptionist desk via the OHCD Housing and Related County Services Guide. OHCD continues to conduct monthly landlord briefings (Owner Outreach Sessions) and participates in various housing forums to promote the HCV program. The Family Self-Sufficiency (FSS)/Home Ownership Programs Coordinator works closely with participants to determine their eligibility for HCV homeownership assistance as well as homeownership in general if eligibility for HCV’s homeownership assistance program is not possible. OHCD’s primary focus continues to improve HCV program management and operations. OHCD continues to explore ways to reduce our per-unit-cost in both short term and long term measures. In the short term, a plan to target families that have zero income for a period of more than ninety (90) days will be employed during this reporting period. As a long term measure, all HCV families will be invited to Family Self-Sufficiency symposiums & seminars during the 2012 calendar year which will focus on various themes including: Education, Entrepreneurship, Financial Management and Employment Readiness. It is hoped that regular HCV clients can also benefit from the information disseminated during the seminars & symposiums that will encourage and aid their progress in becoming more self-sufficient in the long term by increasing education levels and providing the opportunity to gain an increased employment readiness. This will ultimately reduce our per-unit cost.</p> <p>II. Promote self-sufficiency and asset development of families and individuals.</p> <p>PHA Goals: Promote self-sufficiency and asset development of assisted households. Increase the number and percentage of employed persons in assisted families. Identify organization providing employment services that will work with FSS and Welfare to Work families. Work with the Prince William Area Agency on Aging, Community Service Board and Department of Social Services.</p> <p><i>Progress Report:</i> During the 2012 calendar year, the FSS Program has launched level 3.0 of the Family Self-Sufficiency Program curriculum – Pathways - which is a series of symposiums on different topics. The FSS Program Coordinator continues to develop an online curriculum so that participants can take seminars virtually and still complete curriculum requirements should work and/or family schedule conflicts arise. This format will also allow the program to increase the number of seminar offerings as needed. The anticipated launch is January 2013. During the period immediately preceding this reporting period, the FSS Program will present a second “Strengthening Families Day”, the theme of which will be The Celebration of Fatherhood. Through seminars, family strengthening and relationship building will be covered, as well as increasing parenting skills within families of various types (single parent, joint/co-parenting and married couples). Within the event, health and wellness for individuals and families will also be addressed which will continue to purport the holistic approach that PWC’s FSS program takes in providing self-sufficiency programming for families.</p>

<p>10.0 Cont.</p>	<p>Progress Report, continued:</p> <p><i>During this reporting period, which will include half (½) of the anticipated grant period of FSS Coordinator funding, PWC’s FSS Program will continue to develop a partnership with the Workforce Investment Board to develop apprenticeships and job opportunities.</i></p> <p><i>Representatives of entities in the social services network will provide the framework to the Family Self-Sufficiency Program Coordinating Committee; and clients continue to be referred to the County’s Department of Social Services programs and the Northern Virginia SkillSource center in Prince William county to assist with their job search. During the reporting period, OHCD will operate with its new FSS Program Coordinating Committee and will embark on a minimum of three (3) gap analysis studies in the areas of education, employment and health with the goal to determine service gaps and increase services in each of those areas. The resulting goal will be to show a quantitative increase in our families’ quality of life in those same areas. The studies will also provide the opportunity to conduct additional outreach in areas that are unique to Prince William County’s FSS programming. This committee will also focus on the update of the Action Plan. Staff continues to work with various county agencies as necessary to best serve our HCV clients; any new partnerships will be listed in OHCD’s Housing Guide & Related County Services brochure.</i></p> <p>III. Ensure Equal Opportunity in Housing for All Americans</p> <p>PHA Goal includes undertaking affirmative measures to ensure access to assisted housing regardless of race, color, religion, national origin, sex, familial status, and disability. Further the goal includes undertaking affirmative measures to provide a suitable living environment for families in assisted housing regardless of race, color, religion, national origin, sex, familial status, and disability.</p> <p>Process Report: <i>OHCD continues to work closely with the PWC Human Rights Office to ensure proper Fair Housing information is distributed to applicants and participants. As part of the briefing process, OHCD continues to provide Housing Choice Voucher applicants with pertinent information about civil right requirements.</i></p> <p><i>OHCD’s Inspections Unit continues to monitor and enforce HQS measures to ensure program compliance by owners and participants. Rental Assistance staff continues to disseminate, during each stage of the tenancy continuum, information and guidance to reinforce the importance of maintaining suitable living environments. Briefing packages include A Good Place to Live – a HUD publication; and copies of the Virginia Tenant-Landlord Act are made available upon request to tenants and landlords. The Plan contains a certification by the appropriate State or local officials that the Plan is consistent with the applicable Consolidated Plan, which includes a certification that requires the preparation of an Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice, for the PHA's jurisdiction and a description of the manner in which the PHA Plan is consistent with the applicable Consolidated Plan.
3. The PHA certifies that there has been no change, significant or otherwise, to the Capital Fund Program (and Capital Fund Program/Replacement Housing Factor) Annual Statement(s), since submission of its last approved Annual Plan. The Capital Fund Program Annual Statement/Annual Statement/Performance and Evaluation Report must be submitted annually even if there is no change.
4. The PHA has established a Resident Advisory Board or Boards, the membership of which represents the residents assisted by the PHA, consulted with this Board or Boards in developing the Plan, and considered the recommendations of the Board or Boards (24 CFR 903.13). The PHA has included in the Plan submission a copy of the recommendations made by the Resident Advisory Board or Boards and a description of the manner in which the Plan addresses these recommendations.
5. The PHA made the proposed Plan and all information relevant to the public hearing available for public inspection at least 45 days before the hearing, published a notice that a hearing would be held and conducted a hearing to discuss the Plan and invited public comment.
6. The PHA certifies that it will carry out the Plan in conformity with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Fair Housing Act, section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, and title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990.
7. The PHA will affirmatively further fair housing by examining their programs or proposed programs, identify any impediments to fair housing choice within those programs, address those impediments in a reasonable fashion in view of the resources available and work with local jurisdictions to implement any of the jurisdiction's initiatives to affirmatively further fair housing that require the PHA's involvement and maintain records reflecting these analyses and actions.
8. For PHA Plan that includes a policy for site based waiting lists:
 - The PHA regularly submits required data to HUD's 50058 PIC/IMS Module in an accurate, complete and timely manner (as specified in PIH Notice 2006-24);
 - The system of site-based waiting lists provides for full disclosure to each applicant in the selection of the development in which to reside, including basic information about available sites; and an estimate of the period of time the applicant would likely have to wait to be admitted to units of different sizes and types at each site;
 - Adoption of site-based waiting list would not violate any court order or settlement agreement or be inconsistent with a pending complaint brought by HUD;
 - The PHA shall take reasonable measures to assure that such waiting list is consistent with affirmatively furthering fair housing;
 - The PHA provides for review of its site-based waiting list policy to determine if it is consistent with civil rights laws and certifications, as specified in 24 CFR part 903.7(c)(1).
9. The PHA will comply with the prohibitions against discrimination on the basis of age pursuant to the Age Discrimination Act of 1975.
10. The PHA will comply with the Architectural Barriers Act of 1968 and 24 CFR Part 41, Policies and Procedures for the Enforcement of Standards and Requirements for Accessibility by the Physically Handicapped.
11. The PHA will comply with the requirements of section 3 of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968, Employment Opportunities for Low-or Very-Low Income Persons, and with its implementing regulation at 24 CFR Part 135.
12. The PHA will comply with acquisition and relocation requirements of the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970 and implementing regulations at 49 CFR Part 24 as applicable.

13. The PHA will take appropriate affirmative action to award contracts to minority and women's business enterprises under 24 CFR 5.105(a).
14. The PHA will provide the responsible entity or HUD any documentation that the responsible entity or HUD needs to carry out its review under the National Environmental Policy Act and other related authorities in accordance with 24 CFR Part 58 or Part 50, respectively.
15. With respect to public housing the PHA will comply with Davis-Bacon or HUD determined wage rate requirements under Section 12 of the United States Housing Act of 1937 and the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act.
16. The PHA will keep records in accordance with 24 CFR 85.20 and facilitate an effective audit to determine compliance with program requirements.
17. The PHA will comply with the Lead-Based Paint Poisoning Prevention Act, the Residential Lead-Based Paint Hazard Reduction Act of 1992, and 24 CFR Part 35.
18. The PHA will comply with the policies, guidelines, and requirements of OMB Circular No. A-87 (Cost Principles for State, Local and Indian Tribal Governments), 2 CFR Part 225, and 24 CFR Part 85 (Administrative Requirements for Grants and Cooperative Agreements to State, Local and Federally Recognized Indian Tribal Governments).
19. The PHA will undertake only activities and programs covered by the Plan in a manner consistent with its Plan and will utilize covered grant funds only for activities that are approvable under the regulations and included in its Plan.
20. All attachments to the Plan have been and will continue to be available at all times and all locations that the PHA Plan is available for public inspection. All required supporting documents have been made available for public inspection along with the Plan and additional requirements at the primary business office of the PHA and at all other times and locations identified by the PHA in its PHA Plan and will continue to be made available at least at the primary business office of the PHA.
21. The PHA provides assurance as part of this certification that:
 - (i) The Resident Advisory Board had an opportunity to review and comment on the changes to the policies and programs before implementation by the PHA;
 - (ii) The changes were duly approved by the PHA Board of Directors (or similar governing body); and
 - (iii) The revised policies and programs are available for review and inspection, at the principal office of the PHA during normal business hours.
22. The PHA certifies that it is in compliance with all applicable Federal statutory and regulatory requirements.


